COUNTY SEAT: VANCOUVER

Named for Captain William Clark of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, sent to explore the Northwest for the United States in 1803-06

Traditional home of Chinook and associated Salish-language tribes, including Klickitat and Cowlitz American Indian people

Clark County, set inside a major curve of the mighty Columbia River, lies in the extreme southwest corner of Washington. One of the state's oldest counties – with boundaries set as early as 1845 – it proudly regards itself as “the cradle of the Pacific Northwest.” In 1825 the British Hudson's Bay Company established a fur-trading post at Fort Vancouver, setting the stage for frontier settlement north of the Columbia.
