COUNTY SEAT: ASOTIN

Name derived from "Ha-Shu-tin", the Nez Perce Indian name for Asotin Creek, translated as "eel stream"

Traditional home of Nez Perce American Indian people

Bordered by Oregon on the south and Idaho on the east, Asotin County lies in the extreme southeast corner of Washington. The Snake River cuts a canyon nearly 2,000 feet deep along its eastern side. Outside settlers started arriving during the 1860s, spurred by a gold rush in Idaho. But pioneer farmers soon found greater fortune in raising beef cattle and wheat.

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ASOTIN COUNTY COUNTY SEAT: ASOTIN

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BORDERED BY OREGON ON THE SOUTH AND IDAHO ON THE EAST, ASOTIN COUNTY LIES IN THE EXTREME SOUTHEAST CORNER OF WASHINGTON. THE SNAKE RIVER CUTS A CANYON ARRIVING DURING THE 1860S, SPURRED BY A GOLD RUSH IN IDAHO. BUT PIONEER NEARLY 2,000 FEET DEEP ALONG ITS EASTERN SIDE. OUTSIDE SETTLERS STARTED NAME DERIVED FROM "HA-SHU-TIN", THE NEZ PERCE INDIAN NAME FOR ASOTIN CREEK, TRANSLATED AS "EEL STREAM" FARMERS SOON FOUND GREATER FORTUNE IN RAISING BEEF CATTLE AND WHEAT. TRADITIONAL HOME OF NEZ PERCE AMERICAN INDIAN PEOPLE
