COUNTY SEAT: VANCOUVER

Named for Captain William Clark of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, sent to explore the Northwest for the United States in 1803-06

Traditional home of Chinook and associated Salish-language tribes, including Klickitat and Cowlitz American Indian people

Clark County, set inside a major curve of the mighty Columbia River, lies in the extreme southwest corner of Washington. One of the state's oldest counties—with boundaries set as early as 1845—it proudly regards itself as "the cradle of the Pacific Northwest." In 1825 the British Hudson's Bay Company established a fur-trading post at Fort Vancouver, setting the stage for frontier settlement north of the Columbia.

OLDEST COUNTIES, IT PROUDLY REGARDS ITSELF AS "THE CRADLE OF THE PACIFIC LIES IN THE EXTREME SOUTHWEST CORNER OF WASHINGTON. ONE OF THE STATE'S FUR-TRADING POST AT FORT VANCOUVER, SETTING THE STAGE FOR FRONTIER NORTHWEST." IN 1825 THE BRITISH HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY ESTABLISHED A SETTLEMENT NORTH OF THE COLUMBIA RIVER.
