COUNTY SEAT: CHEHALIS

Named for Meriwether Lewis of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, sent to explore the Northwest for the United States in 1803-06

Traditional home of Salish-speaking Upper Chehalis, Upper Cowlitz and Lower Cowlitz American Indian people

In 1838 the agricultural arm of the Hudson's Bay Company established a large farm on Cowlitz Prairie near the present town of Toledo—in part to attract British settlers to the Pacific Northwest. But soon Americans were streaming westward across the Oregon Trail and challenging Britain's claim to what is now Washington. Lewis County is home to one of the oldest surviving American pioneer homes in the state, a peeled-log cabin built by settlers John and Matilda Jackson in 1845.

NAMED FOR MERIWETHER LEWIS OF THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPEDITION, SENT TO EXPLORE THE NORTHWEST FOR THE UNITED STATES IN 1803-06 TRADITIONAL HOME OF SALISH-SPEAKING UPPER CHEHALIS, UPPER COWLITZ AND LOWER COWLITZ AMERICAN INDIAN PEOPLE

OF THE OLDEST SURVIVING AMERICAN PIONEER HOMES IN THE STATE, A PEELED-LOG TO ATTRACT BRITISH SETTLERS TO THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST. BUT SOON AMERICANS LARGE FARM ON COWLITZ PRAIRIE NEAR THE PRESENT TOWN OF TOLEDO - IN PART BRITAIN'S CLAIM TO WHAT IS NOW WASHINGTON. LEWIS COUNTY IS HOME TO ONE IN 1838 THE AGRICULTURAL ARM OF THE HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY ESTABLISHED A WERE STREAMING WESTWARD ACROSS THE OREGON TRAIL AND CHALLENGING CABIN BUILT BY JOHN AND MATILDA JACKSON IN 1845
