BRIEF DESCRIPTION: Concerning design-build contracts.

1 AN ACT Relating to design-build contracts; amending RCW
2 39.10.330, 39.10.470, 39.10.250, 39.10.270, and 39.10.300; and
3 reenacting and amending RCW 39.10.210 and 42.56.270.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 39.10.210 and 2014 c 42 s 1 are each reenacted and
6 amended to read as follows:

7 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in
8 this section apply throughout this chapter.

9 (1) "Alternative public works contracting procedure" means the
10 design-build, general contractor/construction manager, and job order
11 contracting procedures authorized in RCW 39.10.300, 39.10.340, and
12 39.10.420, respectively.

13 (2) "Board" means the capital projects advisory review board.

14 (3) "Certified public body" means a public body certified to use
15 design-build or general contractor/construction manager contracting
16 procedures, or both, under RCW 39.10.270.

17 (4) "Committee," unless otherwise noted, means the project review
18 committee.

19 (5) "Design-build procedure" means a contract between a public
20 body and another party in which the party agrees to both design and

1 build the facility, portion of the facility, or other item specified
2 in the contract.

3 (6) "Disadvantaged business enterprise" means any business entity
4 certified with the office of minority and women's business
5 enterprises under chapter 39.19 RCW.

6 (7) "General contractor/construction manager" means a firm with
7 which a public body has selected to provide services during the
8 design phase and negotiated a maximum allowable construction cost to
9 act as construction manager and general contractor during the
10 construction phase.

11 (8) "Heavy civil construction project" means a civil engineering
12 project, the predominant features of which are infrastructure
13 improvements.

14 (9) "Job order contract" means a contract in which the contractor
15 agrees to a fixed period, indefinite quantity delivery order contract
16 which provides for the use of negotiated, definitive work orders for
17 public works as defined in RCW 39.04.010.

18 (10) "Job order contractor" means a registered or licensed
19 contractor awarded a job order contract.

20 (11) "Maximum allowable construction cost" means the maximum cost
21 of the work to construct the project including a percentage for risk
22 contingency, negotiated support services, and approved change orders.

23 (12) "Negotiated support services" means items a general
24 contractor would normally manage or perform on a construction project
25 including, but not limited to surveying, hoisting, safety
26 enforcement, provision of toilet facilities, temporary heat, cleanup,
27 and trash removal, and that are negotiated as part of the maximum
28 allowable construction cost.

29 (13) "Percent fee" means the percentage amount to be earned by
30 the general contractor/construction manager as overhead and profit.

31 (14) "Price-related factor" means an evaluation factor that
32 impacts costs which may include, but is not limited to overhead and
33 profit, lump sum or guaranteed maximum price for the entire or a
34 portion of the project, operating costs, or other similar factors
35 that may apply to the project.

36 (15) "Public body" means any general or special purpose
37 government in the state of Washington, including but not limited to
38 state agencies, institutions of higher education, counties, cities,
39 towns, ports, school districts, and special purpose districts.

1 ~~((15))~~ (16) "Public works project" means any work for a public
2 body within the definition of "public work" in RCW 39.04.010.

3 ~~((16))~~ (17) "Small business entity" means a small business as
4 defined in RCW 39.26.010.

5 ~~((17))~~ (18) "Total contract cost" means the fixed amount for
6 the detailed specified general conditions work, the negotiated
7 maximum allowable construction cost, and the percent fee on the
8 negotiated maximum allowable construction cost.

9 ~~((18))~~ (19) "Total project cost" means the cost of the project
10 less financing and land acquisition costs.

11 ~~((19))~~ (20) "Unit price book" means a book containing specific
12 prices, based on generally accepted industry standards and
13 information, where available, for various items of work to be
14 performed by the job order contractor. The prices may include: All
15 the costs of materials; labor; equipment; overhead, including bonding
16 costs; and profit for performing the items of work. The unit prices
17 for labor must be at the rates in effect at the time the individual
18 work order is issued.

19 ~~((20))~~ (21) "Work order" means an order issued for a definite
20 scope of work to be performed pursuant to a job order contract.

21 **Sec. 2.** RCW 39.10.330 and 2014 c 19 s 1 are each amended to read
22 as follows:

23 (1) Contracts for design-build services shall be awarded through
24 a competitive process using public solicitation of proposals for
25 design-build services. The public body shall publish at least once in
26 a legal newspaper of general circulation published in, or as near as
27 possible to, that part of the county in which the public work will be
28 done, a notice of its request for qualifications from proposers for
29 design-build services, and the availability and location of the
30 request for proposal documents. The request for qualifications
31 documents shall include:

32 (a) A ~~((general))~~ description of the project ~~((that provides
33 sufficient information for proposers to submit qualifications))~~
34 including the estimated design-build contract value and the intended
35 use of the project;

36 (b) The reasons for using the design-build procedure;

37 (c) A description of the qualifications to be required of the
38 proposer ~~((including, but not limited to, submission of the
39 proposer's accident prevention program));~~

1 (d) A description of the process the public body will use to
2 evaluate qualifications and finalists' proposals, including
3 evaluation factors and the relative weight of factors and any
4 specific forms to be used by the proposers;

5 (i) Evaluation factors for (~~request for~~) qualifications shall
6 include(~~(, but not be limited to,)~~) technical qualifications, such as
7 specialized experience and technical competence of the firms and the
8 key design and construction personnel; (~~capability~~) capacity to
9 perform; (~~past performance of the proposers' team, including the~~
10 ~~architect-engineer and construction members~~) ability to provide a
11 performance and payment bond for the project; and other appropriate
12 factors. Evaluation factors may also include(~~(+-(A+))~~), but are not
13 limited to, the proposer's past performance in utilization of small
14 business entities(~~(+)~~) and (~~(+B+)~~) disadvantaged business
15 enterprises. Cost or price-related factors are not permitted in the
16 request for qualifications phase;

17 (ii) Evaluation factors for finalists' proposals shall include
18 the management plan to meet time and budget requirements and one or
19 more price-related factors. Evaluation factors may also include, but
20 not be limited to, (~~the factors listed in (d)(i) of this subsection,~~
21 ~~as well as technical approach design concept; ability of professional~~
22 ~~personnel; past performance on similar projects; ability to meet time~~
23 ~~and budget requirements; ability to provide a performance and payment~~
24 ~~bond for the project; recent, current, and projected workloads of the~~
25 ~~firm; location; and cost or price related factors that may include~~
26 ~~operating costs. The public body may also consider a proposer's~~) the
27 technical approach, design concept, and the outreach plan to include
28 small business entities and disadvantaged business enterprises as
29 subconsultants, subcontractors, and suppliers for the project(~~(-~~
30 ~~Alternatively, if the public body determines that all finalists will~~
31 ~~be capable of producing a design that adequately meets project~~
32 ~~requirements, the public body may award the contract to the firm that~~
33 ~~submits the responsive proposal with the lowest price))~~);

34 (e) Protest procedures including time limits for filing a
35 protest, which in no event may limit the time to file a protest to
36 fewer than four business days from the date the proposer was notified
37 of the selection decision;

38 (f) The (~~form of the~~) proposed contract (~~to be awarded~~);

39 (g) The honorarium to be paid to finalists submitting responsive
40 proposals and who are not awarded a design-build contract;

1 (h) The schedule for the procurement process and the project; and

2 (i) Other information relevant to the project.

3 (2) The public body shall establish an evaluation committee to
4 evaluate the responses to the request for qualifications based solely
5 on the factors, weighting, and process identified in the request for
6 qualifications and any addenda issued by the public body. Based on
7 the evaluation committee's findings, the public body shall select not
8 more than five responsive and responsible finalists to submit
9 proposals. The public body may, in its sole discretion, reject all
10 proposals and shall provide its reasons for rejection in writing to
11 all proposers.

12 (3) The public body must notify all proposers of the finalists
13 selected to move to the next phase of the selection process. The
14 process may not proceed to the next phase until two business days
15 after all proposers are notified of the committee's selection
16 decision. At the request of a proposer not selected as a finalist,
17 the public body must provide the requesting proposer with a scoring
18 summary of the evaluation factors for its proposal. Proposers filing
19 a protest on the selection of the finalists must file the protest in
20 accordance with the published protest procedures. The selection
21 process may not advance to the next phase of selection until two
22 business days after the final protest decision is transmitted to the
23 protestor.

24 (4) Upon selection of the finalists, the public body shall issue
25 a request for proposals to the finalists(~~(, which shall provide the~~
26 ~~following information)).~~ The request for proposal documents shall
27 include:

28 (a) ~~((A detailed description of the project including~~
29 ~~programmatic, performance, and technical requirements and~~
30 ~~specifications; functional and operational elements; building~~
31 ~~performance goals and validation requirements; minimum and maximum~~
32 ~~net and gross areas of any building; and, at the discretion of the~~
33 ~~public body, preliminary engineering and architectural drawings; and~~

34 ~~(b) The target budget for the design-build portion of the~~
35 ~~project))~~ Any specific forms to be used by the finalists; and

36 (b) Submission of a summary of the finalist's accident prevention
37 program and an overview of its implementation.

38 (5) The public body shall establish an evaluation committee to
39 evaluate the proposals submitted by the finalists. ~~((Design-build~~
40 ~~contracts shall be awarded using the procedures in (a) or (b) of this~~

1 subsection. The public body must identify in the request for
2 qualifications which procedure will be used.

3 (a)) The finalists' proposals shall be evaluated and scored
4 based solely on the factors, weighting, and process identified in the
5 ((initial)) request for qualifications, the request for proposals,
6 and in any addenda published by the public body. Public bodies may
7 request best and final proposals from finalists. The public body may
8 initiate negotiations with the ((firm)) finalist submitting the
9 highest scored proposal. If the public body is unable to execute a
10 contract with the ((firm)) finalist submitting the highest scored
11 proposal, negotiations with that ((firm)) finalist may be suspended
12 or terminated and the public body may proceed to negotiate with the
13 next highest scored ((firm)) finalist. Public bodies shall continue
14 in accordance with this procedure until a contract agreement is
15 reached or the selection process is terminated.

16 ((b) If the public body determines that all finalists are
17 capable of producing a design that adequately meets project
18 requirements, the public body may award the contract to the firm that
19 submits the responsive proposal with the lowest price.))

20 (6) The public body shall notify all finalists of the selection
21 decision and make a selection summary of the final proposals
22 available to all proposers within two business days of such
23 notification. If the public body receives a timely written protest
24 from a finalist firm, the public body may not execute a contract
25 until two business days after the final protest decision is
26 transmitted to the protestor. The protestor must submit its protest
27 in accordance with the published protest procedures.

28 (7) The firm awarded the contract shall provide a performance and
29 payment bond for the contracted amount.

30 (8) The public body shall provide appropriate honorarium payments
31 to finalists submitting responsive proposals that are not awarded a
32 design-build contract. Honorarium payments shall be sufficient to
33 generate meaningful competition among potential proposers on design-
34 build projects. In determining the amount of the honorarium, the
35 public body shall ((consider)) recognize the level of effort required
36 to meet the selection criteria.

37 **Sec. 3.** RCW 39.10.470 and 2014 c 19 s 2 are each amended to read
38 as follows:

1 (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this
2 section, all proceedings, records, contracts, and other public
3 records relating to alternative public works transactions under this
4 chapter shall be open to the inspection of any interested person,
5 firm, or corporation in accordance with chapter 42.56 RCW.

6 (2) Trade secrets, as defined in RCW 19.108.010, or other
7 proprietary information submitted by a bidder, offeror, or contractor
8 in connection with an alternative public works transaction under this
9 chapter shall not be subject to chapter 42.56 RCW if the bidder,
10 offeror, or contractor specifically states in writing the reasons why
11 protection is necessary, and identifies the data or materials to be
12 protected.

13 (3) ~~((Proposals submitted by design-build finalists))~~ All
14 documents related to a procurement under RCW 39.10.330 are exempt
15 from disclosure until the notification of the highest scoring
16 finalist is made in accordance with RCW 39.10.330~~((+5))~~ (6) or the
17 selection process is terminated, except as expressly required under
18 RCW 39.10.330(3).

19 **Sec. 4.** RCW 39.10.250 and 2013 c 222 s 5 are each amended to
20 read as follows:

21 The committee shall:

22 (1) Certify, or renew certification for, public bodies to use
23 design-build or general contractor/construction manager contracting
24 procedures, or both;

25 (2) Review and approve the use of the design-build or general
26 contractor/construction manager contracting procedures on a project
27 by project basis for public bodies that are not certified under RCW
28 39.10.270;

29 ~~((Review and approve not more than fifteen projects using the
30 design-build contracting procedure by noncertified public bodies for
31 projects that have a total project cost between two million and ten
32 million dollars. Projects must meet the criteria in RCW 39.10.300(1).
33 Where possible, the committee shall approve projects among multiple
34 public bodies. At least annually, the committee shall report to the
35 board regarding the committee's review procedure of these projects
36 and its recommendations for further use; and~~

37 ~~(+4))~~ Review and approve not more than two design-build
38 demonstration projects that include procurement of operations and
39 maintenance services for a period longer than three years.

1 **Sec. 5.** RCW 39.10.270 and 2017 c 211 s 1 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 (1) A public body may apply for certification to use the design-
4 build or general contractor/construction manager contracting
5 procedure, or both. Once certified, a public body may use the
6 contracting procedure for which it is certified on individual
7 projects without seeking committee approval for a period of three
8 years. (~~Public bodies certified to use the design-build procedure~~
9 ~~are limited to no more than five projects with a total project cost~~
10 ~~between two and ten million dollars during the certification~~
11 ~~period.~~) A public body seeking certification must submit to the
12 committee an application in a format and manner as prescribed by the
13 committee. The application must include a description of the public
14 body's qualifications, its capital plan during the certification
15 period, and its intended use of alternative contracting procedures.

16 (2) A public body seeking certification for the design-build
17 procedure must demonstrate successful management of at least one
18 design-build project within the previous five years. A public body
19 seeking certification for the general contractor/construction manager
20 procedure must demonstrate successful management of at least one
21 general contractor/construction manager project within the previous
22 five years.

23 (3) To certify a public body, the committee shall determine that
24 the public body:

25 (a) Has the necessary experience and qualifications to determine
26 which projects are appropriate for using alternative contracting
27 procedures;

28 (b) Has the necessary experience and qualifications to carry out
29 the alternative contracting procedure including, but not limited to:
30 (i) Project delivery knowledge and experience; (ii) personnel with
31 appropriate construction experience; (iii) a management plan and
32 rationale for its alternative public works projects; (iv)
33 demonstrated success in managing public works projects; (v) the
34 ability to properly manage its capital facilities plan including, but
35 not limited to, appropriate project planning and budgeting
36 experience; and (vi) the ability to meet requirements of this
37 chapter; and

38 (c) Has resolved any audit findings on previous public works
39 projects in a manner satisfactory to the committee.

1 (4) The committee shall, if practicable, make its determination
2 at the public meeting during which an application for certification
3 is reviewed. Public comments must be considered before a
4 determination is made. Within ten business days of the public
5 meeting, the committee shall provide a written determination to the
6 public body, and make its determination available to the public on
7 the committee's web site.

8 (5) The committee may revoke any public body's certification upon
9 a finding, after a public hearing, that its use of design-build or
10 general contractor/construction manager contracting procedures no
11 longer serves the public interest.

12 (6) The committee may renew the certification of a public body
13 for additional three-year periods. The public body must submit an
14 application for recertification at least three months before the
15 initial certification expires. The committee may accept late
16 applications, if administratively feasible, to avoid expiration of
17 certification on a case-by-case basis. The application shall include
18 updated information on the public body's experience and current
19 staffing with the procedure it is applying to renew, and any other
20 information requested in advance by the committee. The committee must
21 review the application for recertification at a meeting held before
22 expiration of the applicant's initial certification period. A public
23 body must reapply for certification under the process described in
24 subsection (1) of this section once the period of recertification
25 expires.

26 (7) Certified public bodies must submit project data information
27 as required in RCW 39.10.320 and 39.10.350.

28 **Sec. 6.** RCW 39.10.300 and 2013 c 222 s 9 are each amended to
29 read as follows:

30 (1) Subject to the requirements in RCW 39.10.250, 39.10.270, or
31 39.10.280, public bodies may utilize the design-build procedure,
32 including progressive design-build, for public works projects in
33 which the total project cost is over (~~ten~~) two million dollars and
34 where:

35 (a) The construction activities are highly specialized and a
36 design-build approach is critical in developing the construction
37 methodology; or

38 (b) The projects selected provide opportunity for greater
39 innovation or efficiencies between the designer and the builder; or

1 (c) Significant savings in project delivery time would be
2 realized.

3 (2) Subject to the process in RCW 39.10.270 or 39.10.280, public
4 bodies may use the design-build procedure for parking garages,
5 regardless of cost.

6 (3) The design-build procedure may be used for the construction
7 or erection of portable facilities as defined in WAC 392-343-018,
8 preengineered metal buildings, or not more than ten prefabricated
9 modular buildings per installation site, regardless of cost and is
10 not subject to approval by the committee.

11 (4) Except for utility projects and approved demonstration
12 projects, the design-build procedure may not be used to procure
13 operations and maintenance services for a period longer than three
14 years. State agency projects that propose to use the design-build-
15 operate-maintain procedure shall submit cost estimates for the
16 construction portion of the project consistent with the office of
17 financial management's capital budget requirements. Operations and
18 maintenance costs must be shown separately and must not be included
19 as part of the capital budget request.

20 ~~(5) ((Subject to the process in RCW 39.10.280, public bodies may~~
21 ~~use the design-build procedure for public works projects in which the~~
22 ~~total project cost is between two million and ten million dollars and~~
23 ~~that meet one of the criteria in subsection (1)(a), (b), or (c) of~~
24 ~~this section.~~

25 ~~(6))~~ Subject to the process in RCW 39.10.280, a public body may
26 seek committee approval for a design-build demonstration project that
27 includes procurement of operations and maintenance services for a
28 period longer than three years.

29 **Sec. 7.** RCW 42.56.270 and 2018 c 201 s 8008, 2018 c 196 s 21,
30 and 2018 c 4 s 9 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

31 The following financial, commercial, and proprietary information
32 is exempt from disclosure under this chapter:

33 (1) Valuable formulae, designs, drawings, computer source code or
34 object code, and research data obtained by any agency within five
35 years of the request for disclosure when disclosure would produce
36 private gain and public loss;

37 (2) Financial information supplied by or on behalf of a person,
38 firm, or corporation for the purpose of qualifying to submit a bid or
39 proposal for (a) a ferry system construction or repair contract as

1 required by RCW 47.60.680 through 47.60.750 (~~(e)~~); (b) highway
2 construction or improvement as required by RCW 47.28.070; or (c)
3 alternative public works contracting procedures as required by RCW
4 39.10.200 through 39.10.905;

5 (3) Financial and commercial information and records supplied by
6 private persons pertaining to export services provided under chapters
7 43.163 and 53.31 RCW, and by persons pertaining to export projects
8 under RCW 43.23.035;

9 (4) Financial and commercial information and records supplied by
10 businesses or individuals during application for loans or program
11 services provided by chapters 43.325, 43.163, 43.160, 43.330, and
12 43.168 RCW, or during application for economic development loans or
13 program services provided by any local agency;

14 (5) Financial information, business plans, examination reports,
15 and any information produced or obtained in evaluating or examining a
16 business and industrial development corporation organized or seeking
17 certification under chapter 31.24 RCW;

18 (6) Financial and commercial information supplied to the state
19 investment board by any person when the information relates to the
20 investment of public trust or retirement funds and when disclosure
21 would result in loss to such funds or in private loss to the
22 providers of this information;

23 (7) Financial and valuable trade information under RCW 51.36.120;

24 (8) Financial, commercial, operations, and technical and research
25 information and data submitted to or obtained by the clean Washington
26 center in applications for, or delivery of, program services under
27 chapter 70.95H RCW;

28 (9) Financial and commercial information requested by the public
29 stadium authority from any person or organization that leases or uses
30 the stadium and exhibition center as defined in RCW 36.102.010;

31 (10)(a) Financial information, including but not limited to
32 account numbers and values, and other identification numbers supplied
33 by or on behalf of a person, firm, corporation, limited liability
34 company, partnership, or other entity related to an application for a
35 horse racing license submitted pursuant to RCW 67.16.260(1)(b),
36 marijuana producer, processor, or retailer license, liquor license,
37 gambling license, or lottery retail license;

38 (b) Internal control documents, independent auditors' reports and
39 financial statements, and supporting documents: (i) Of house-banked
40 social card game licensees required by the gambling commission

1 pursuant to rules adopted under chapter 9.46 RCW; or (ii) submitted
2 by tribes with an approved tribal/state compact for class III gaming;

3 (11) Proprietary data, trade secrets, or other information that
4 relates to: (a) A vendor's unique methods of conducting business; (b)
5 data unique to the product or services of the vendor; or (c)
6 determining prices or rates to be charged for services, submitted by
7 any vendor to the department of social and health services or the
8 health care authority for purposes of the development, acquisition,
9 or implementation of state purchased health care as defined in RCW
10 41.05.011;

11 (12)(a) When supplied to and in the records of the department of
12 commerce:

13 (i) Financial and proprietary information collected from any
14 person and provided to the department of commerce pursuant to RCW
15 43.330.050(8); and

16 (ii) Financial or proprietary information collected from any
17 person and provided to the department of commerce or the office of
18 the governor in connection with the siting, recruitment, expansion,
19 retention, or relocation of that person's business and until a siting
20 decision is made, identifying information of any person supplying
21 information under this subsection and the locations being considered
22 for siting, relocation, or expansion of a business;

23 (b) When developed by the department of commerce based on
24 information as described in (a)(i) of this subsection, any work
25 product is not exempt from disclosure;

26 (c) For the purposes of this subsection, "siting decision" means
27 the decision to acquire or not to acquire a site;

28 (d) If there is no written contact for a period of sixty days to
29 the department of commerce from a person connected with siting,
30 recruitment, expansion, retention, or relocation of that person's
31 business, information described in (a)(ii) of this subsection will be
32 available to the public under this chapter;

33 (13) Financial and proprietary information submitted to or
34 obtained by the department of ecology or the authority created under
35 chapter 70.95N RCW to implement chapter 70.95N RCW;

36 (14) Financial, commercial, operations, and technical and
37 research information and data submitted to or obtained by the life
38 sciences discovery fund authority in applications for, or delivery
39 of, grants under chapter 43.350 RCW, to the extent that such

1 information, if revealed, would reasonably be expected to result in
2 private loss to the providers of this information;

3 (15) Financial and commercial information provided as evidence to
4 the department of licensing as required by RCW 19.112.110 or
5 19.112.120, except information disclosed in aggregate form that does
6 not permit the identification of information related to individual
7 fuel licensees;

8 (16) Any production records, mineral assessments, and trade
9 secrets submitted by a permit holder, mine operator, or landowner to
10 the department of natural resources under RCW 78.44.085;

11 (17)(a) Farm plans developed by conservation districts, unless
12 permission to release the farm plan is granted by the landowner or
13 operator who requested the plan, or the farm plan is used for the
14 application or issuance of a permit;

15 (b) Farm plans developed under chapter 90.48 RCW and not under
16 the federal clean water act, 33 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq., are subject
17 to RCW 42.56.610 and 90.64.190;

18 (18) Financial, commercial, operations, and technical and
19 research information and data submitted to or obtained by a health
20 sciences and services authority in applications for, or delivery of,
21 grants under RCW 35.104.010 through 35.104.060, to the extent that
22 such information, if revealed, would reasonably be expected to result
23 in private loss to providers of this information;

24 (19) Information gathered under chapter 19.85 RCW or RCW
25 34.05.328 that can be identified to a particular business;

26 (20) Financial and commercial information submitted to or
27 obtained by the University of Washington, other than information the
28 university is required to disclose under RCW 28B.20.150, when the
29 information relates to investments in private funds, to the extent
30 that such information, if revealed, would reasonably be expected to
31 result in loss to the University of Washington consolidated endowment
32 fund or to result in private loss to the providers of this
33 information;

34 (21) Market share data submitted by a manufacturer under RCW
35 70.95N.190(4);

36 (22) Financial information supplied to the department of
37 financial institutions or to a portal under RCW 21.20.883, when filed
38 by or on behalf of an issuer of securities for the purpose of
39 obtaining the exemption from state securities registration for small
40 securities offerings provided under RCW 21.20.880 or when filed by or
