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OVERVIEW



- Department of Enterprise Services (DES) is the state's lead procurement agency.
- DES also procures and manages around 200 statewide contracts with around 1,500 vendors.
- DES is responsible for developing and implementing procurement policies and procedures for Washington agencies.

STATUTORY DIRECTIVE





Legislature intends that the state develop procurement policies, procedures, and materials that encourage and facilitate state agency purchase of goods and services from Washington small businesses.



RCW 39.26.090



Executive Order

EO 22-01: Equity in Public Contracting requires cabinet agencies to use the Tools for Equity to improve the scope and equity of public spending in Washington

2019 DISPARITY STUDY





SUPPLIER DIVERSITY POLICY

- Enterprise Services Policy No. POL-DES-090-06 - Supplier **Diversity**
 - Effective April 1, 2023
- Supplier Diversity Virtual Handbook



Reason for Policy

The Legislature has directed the Department of Enterprise Services to develop procurement policies and procedures that encourage and facilitate the purchase of goods and services from Washington small businesses, microbusinesses, minibusinesses, diverse, and veteran-owned businesses to the maximum extent practicable. Supplier diversity adds value such as innovation, quality improvements, efficiencies, and cost savings.

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that all procurement professionals and those with acquisition responsibilities use approved, legally compliant strategies that encourage and facilitate the purchase of goods and services from small, diverse, and veteran-owned businesses to the maximum extent possible. Agencies must take action to remove barriers that prevent small, diverse, and veteran-owned businesses from receiving equitable access to state goods and services procurements.

D-1 STATEWIDE / COOPERATIVE CONTRACT CONSIDERATIONS

- Statewide contracts generally an exception because DES has already conducted the solicitation in compliance with SDP
- When DES approves a cooperative contract, it assures that the contract complies with WA policies, including SDP
- Wrinkle: two-tier contracts
 - Although DES has created a pool of vendors (e.g. ITPS), an agency conducting a competitive solicitation the pool must still comply with the forecasting and outreach portions of the SDP

D-2 EMERGENCY CONTRACT CONSIDERATIONS

- An exception because DES acknowledges that procurement rules should not impede emergency responses by agencies
- Emergency events are unforeseen circumstances beyond the control of the agency that either:
 - Present a real, immediate, and extreme threat to the proper performance of essential functions; or
 - May reasonably be expected to result in material loss or damage to property, bodily injury, or loss of life, if immediate action is not taken.

D-3 — CONTRACTS THAT VIOLATE INTERNATIONAL TRADE AGREEMENTS

- How to know if a solicitation will be a violation: check current trade agreements examples include:
 - GATT (General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade)/WTO (World Trade Organization)
 - NAFTA (North American Free Trade Agreement)

NAFTA:	Supply Contract (equal to or exceeding)	Service Contract (equal to or exceeding)

D-3 — CONTRACTS THAT VIOLATE INTERNATIONAL TRADE AGREEMENTS - EXAMPLES

D-4 — CONTRACTS USING FEDERAL FUNDS

- Why an exception?
 - Federal funds often have a requirement to follow federal procurement law and/or regulations. These federal rules may preclude the Supplier Diversity Policy
- What to do?
 - Explain why the exception applies to the contract in the contract file

D-4 — Contracts Using Federal Funds — some details

Geographical preferences may not be used when utilizing Federal funding

- Excludes the usage of Washington Small Business
 - WEBS utilizes definition of small business as located in WA State
- Excludes usage of veteran preferences
 - WEBS utilizes Veteran owned as registered with WA DVA

Requirement located in:

- 2 CFR Subpart D Post Federal Award Requirements
- Procurement Standards (§§ 200.317 200.327)

2 CFR 200.317 Procurements by states.

• When procuring property and services under a Federal award, a State must follow the same policies and procedures it uses for procurements from its non-Federal funds.

2 CFR 200.319(c)

- "The non-Federal entity must conduct procurements in a manner that prohibits the use of statutorily or administratively imposed state, local, or tribal geographical preferences in the evaluation of bids or proposals, except in those cases where applicable Federal statutes expressly mandate or encourage geographic preference.
- To do: Document why the exception applies to the contract in the contract file

D-5 — REQUEST TO SUPPORT A BUSINESS NEED

- DES has received one formal request from an agency. It was withdrawn.
- One informal request was presented. It too was withdrawn.

- Key consideration: the requesting agency must answer this question:
 - Why is the exception necessary for the agency to fulfill its mission?
- Best practice: consult with the DES Policy Team for next steps
