HB 1023	Concerning predesign requirements and thresholds. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increases the threshold for non-higher education capital construction projects requiring predesign to \$10 million, which establishes the same threshold for all capital project types. • Provides the Office of Financial Management (OFM) the authority to waive some or all predesign requirements on capital projects exceeding the \$10 million threshold. • Requires the OFM to notify the legislative fiscal committees of any waivers. HB 1103 <i>Companion</i> SB 5366	Improving environmental and social outcomes with the production of building materials. <i>(Environmental product declaration (EPD) reporting by contractors and send to Commerce) for projects larger than 25,000 sf new or renovation of occupied or conditioned space >50% of assessed value)</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Requires firms selected for large construction or building renovation contracts to provide an Environmental Product Declaration (EPD) and labor data for at least 90 percent of the weight of covered materials used in the project (primary reporting requirements). • Provides alternative reporting requirements for firms that cannot fulfill the primary reporting requirements on the grounds of hardship. • Directs the University of Washington College of Built Environment to create a publicly accessible database, with projects anonymized, to report the collected data. • Directs the Department of Commerce to submit a report to the Legislature summarizing the collected data by January 1, 2025. Specifies minimum requirements when an agency develops, procures, or uses an ADS. Prohibits an agency from using ADS or equipment incorporating artificial intelligence-enabled profiling under certain conditions. Requires the Office of the Chief Information Officer to adopt rules, inventory, review algorithmic accountability reports, and conduct audits for ADS. Requires the Washington state chief information officer to adopt rules regarding the development, procurement, and use of ADS by a public agency. Requires the algorithmic accountability review office inventory, review algorithmic accountability reports, post certain information on its website, and conduct audits for ADS.
