COUNTY SEAT: WALLA WALLA

Named for the Walla Walla Indian people, derived from a Shaptin-language word translated as "little river"

Traditional home of Cayuse, Palouse, Umatilla, Walla Walla and Wanapum American Indian people

By 1836 both Hudson's Bay Company fur traders and American missionaries had arrived in what is now Walla Walla County. Soldiers and settlers followed. Created in 1854 as the first county in eastern Washington Territory, Walla Walla County once reached from the eastern slopes of the Cascade Range all the way to Montana. Early settlements prospered by outfitting miners headed for the Idaho gold fields during the 1860s. The first Walla Walla sweet onion, the region's signature crop, was produced in 1900.

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BY 1836 BOTH HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY FUR TRADERS AND AMERICAN MISSIONARIES HAD ARRIVED IN WHAT IS NOW WALLA WALLA COUNTY. SOLDIERS AND SETTLERS FOLLOWED. CREATED IN 1854 AS THE FIRST COUNTY IN EASTERN WASHINGTON TERRITORY, WALLA WALLA COUNTY ONCE REACHED FROM THE EASTERN SLOPES OF THE CASCADE RANGE ALL THE WAY TO MONTANA. EARLY SETTLEMENTS PROSPERED BY OUTFITTING MINERS HEADED FOR THE IDAHO GOLD FIELDS DURING THE 1860S. THE FIRST WALLA WALLA
